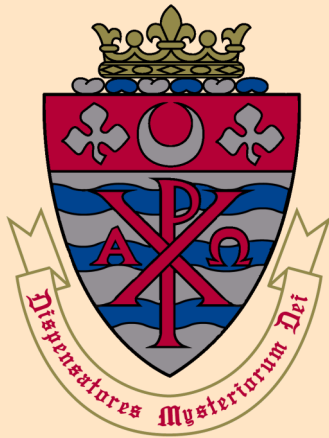

Course Description: This course will allow students to journey through the development of Christianity from the time of Reformation to the present day. This course also will utilize primary source materials and audiovisual presentations so that students may have a better historical perspective of these time periods.

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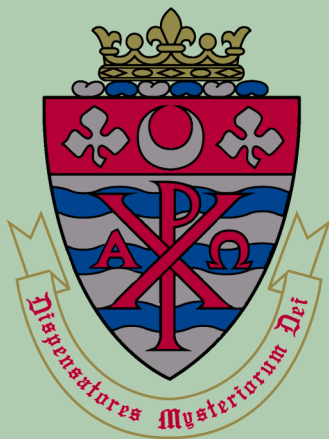

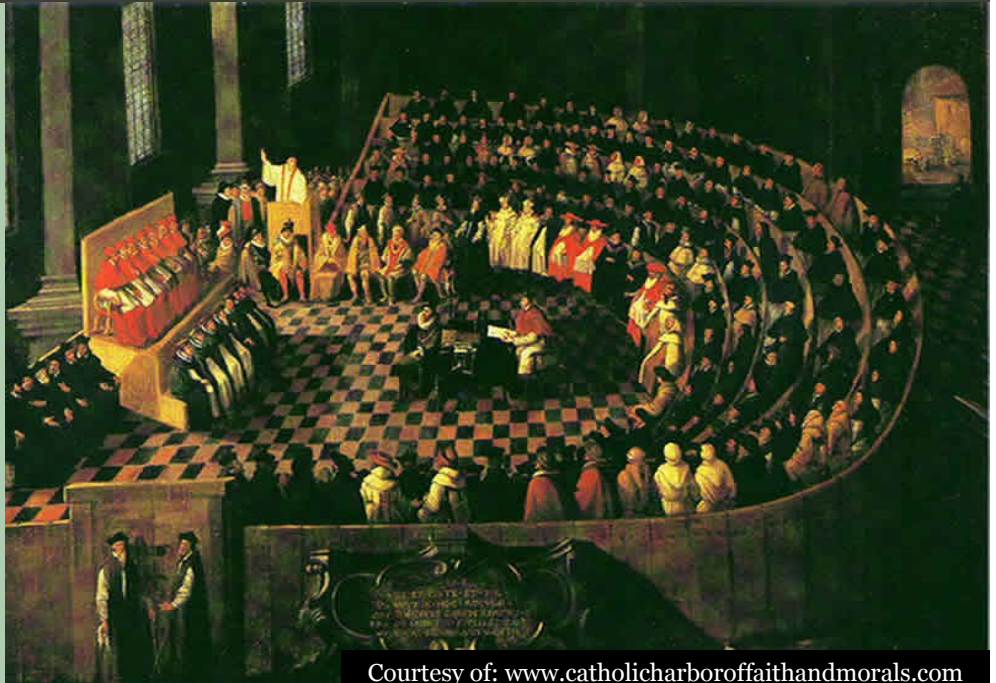

Professor: Rev. Mark Francis O'Malley, Hist.Eccl.D.

Course Description: This course provides a survey of ecclesiastical history from the late 15th century to the mid-20th century. Particular consideration is given to the remote and immediate factors which contributed to the Catholic reform movement and Protestant reformation of the 16th century. The key figures, events, and movements of the religious and political warring of the 17th century which brought an end to Christendom and a fragmentation of the cultural and political unity of Europe; the religious, intellectual, and political challenges which confronted the Church in the 18th century; as well as the activity of the Church in the secularized climate of the 19th and 20th centuries are explored.

Reverend Mark Francis O'Malley, Hist.Eccl.D., *Assistant Professor of Church History*, received an M.Div. (1995) from Immaculate Conception Seminary and earned a licentiate (2006) and doctorate (2009) in Ecclesiastical History from the Pontifical Gregorian University, Rome. Father O'Malley also has pursued his interest in manuscripts and document form at the Center of Manuscript Studies at the University of London.

Course Description: This course will provide students a survey of the history of Christian Spirituality from its Biblical origins to its contemporary situations. Students will be given an opportunity to delve deeply into the Patristic period, the time of the Desert Fathers, the Franciscan and Dominican renewals, medieval spirituality, 20th-century movements, and so forth. Moreover, this course will encourage students to tap into the spirituality of saints such as Benedict, Augustine, Ignatius, and Francis de Sales.

Dianne M. Traflet, J.D., S.T.D., Associate Dean, Assistant Professor of Pastoral Theology and Founder and Co-Director of the Institute for Christian Spirituality, earned a J.D. from Seton Hall University School of Law and an S.T.L. and an S.T.D. from the Pontifical University of St. Thomas Aquinas (The Angelicum) in Rome. She gives numerous lectures and retreats on St. Edith Stein and related topics in spirituality, and is the author of *Edith Stein: A Spiritual Portrait* (Pauline Media, 2008). Her recent classes include *Women Mystics, Theology and Practice of Prayer, Spiritual Theology and Public Speaking* and *Marian Spirituality*.
