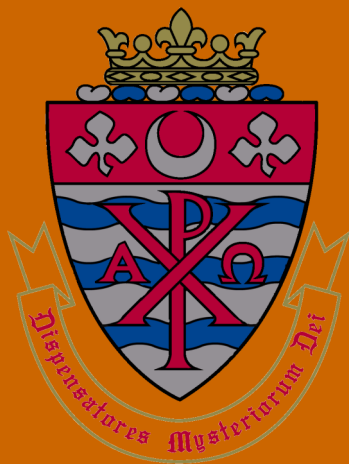

Course Description: This course will examine the defining elements of Catholic evangelization, including: biblical warrants, church documents, and papal teachings. Particular emphasis will be given to Pope John Paul II's concept of the New Evangelization and Pope Benedict's recent teachings. Select programs for evangelization in parish ministry also will be discussed, including methods to encourage evangelization in daily life.

Professor: Lois Gandt, Ph.D.

Course Description: This course explores the development of Christian monasticism from its roots in the Gospels and ancient ascetic practices through the religious orders founded during the Catholic Reformation. Primary sources are utilized to investigate the lives of monks, the transplantation of the desert tradition to the West, monastic rules, the dominance of the *Rule of St. Benedict*, and the rise of mendicant orders.

Lois Gandt, Ph.D., Adjunct Professor of Systematic Theology, holds a Ph.D. in Theology from Fordham University. Her research has focused on the monasticism of the fourth-century Egyptian desert and its contribution to the development of western monasticism.
