applying as a freshman

In considering applicants to Seton Hall, our review includes a comprehensive analysis of your academic background, the strength of the high school program and the grades earned in those courses. In addition, we also take into consideration standardized test scores, essays, letters of recommendation, extracurricular activities, interviews (if applicable) and interest in the University.

To be considered for admission, your admission file must be complete including the application for admission, official secondary school transcript, official SAT or ACT scores, Counselor Report, Teacher Evaluation, personal essay and payment of the application fee. We encourage you to submit your Counselor Report, Teacher Evaluation and Secondary School Transcripts with your application.

Rolling Admission

Seton Hall uses a rolling admission process, which means we accept and review applications on an ongoing basis. We begin reviewing application in early December, and decision letters are sent out on an ongoing basis beginning in December. Applicants to EOP, Athletic Training, Physical Therapy, Physician Assistant, Occupational Therapy, Speech-Language Pathology and Dual Admission programs can expect a longer processing period.

Official Secondary School Transcript

Transcripts must be official copies with either a school seal or an original signature sent in a sealed envelope or directly by the guidance office.

Official SAT or ACT Scores

Scores should be sent directly from the testing center. However, test scores sent as part of your high school transcript will be accepted. Seton Hall will combine your highest test scores when reviewing your application.

For Fall 2007 freshman applicants, we will evaluate your critical reading and math SAT scores or ACT scores. Visit our Web site admissions.shu.edu for more information.

Counselor Report

This form must be completed by your guidance counselor or college advisor. We prefer your counselor return this form with your application materials. However, if it is sent separately, it must be sent to Seton Hall directly by your guidance counselor.

Teacher Evaluation

This form must be completed by a teacher who has taught you directly. Teachers completing this form should return it to your guidance office for mailing, or mail it directly to Seton Hall in a signed and sealed envelope. Multiple recommendations will be accepted.

Personal Essay

Your essay should be typed and double-spaced, and it should not exceed 500 words.

Interviews

If you would like to have an interview included as part of your application, you can arrange an appointment by contacting the Office of Admissions.

Application Fee

Please submit a check or money order for \$55 payable to Seton Hall University with your application form. For online applications, the fee is \$45 and must be made by credit card. Official fee waivers submitted by your guidance counselor will be accepted (fee waivers are not accepted online).

special programs for freshmen

Seton Hall is proud to offer an array of outstanding special programs designed to add even greater academic challenge and breadth to many of our offerings. To apply to any of these programs, you must designate your choice on page 6 and submit any additional materials required. University Honors Program

The focus of our University Honors Program is to meet the academic aspirations of our best students — those who want to integrate creativity, special challenges, and diverse resources with in-depth study. The University Honors Program is available to students from all academic disciplines. Admission to the program is highly selective. To be eligible, you must have a GPA of 3.3 and/or a combined SAT score of 1250 (CR+M), with a minimum of 600 critical reading. Separate application is required. Visit academic.shu.edu/honors for more information.

Pre-Law/Dual Law Admission

Seton Hall offers a dual admission program with the School of Law. Students accepted to the program go straight through for seven years to earn both an undergraduate degree from Seton Hall and a law degree from the School of Law. If you are admitted, you do not have to take the LSAT. To be eligible, you must have a GPA of 3.0 and a combined SAT score of 1200 (CR+M), with a minimum of 650 critical reading. To apply, complete this application, select a major and check off “dual law admission program” under the section for pre-professional programs.

Pre-Professional Programs

Pre-professional programs are not majors; therefore, Seton Hall does not grant a degree in these fields. If you decide to participate in one of the pre-professional programs, you must also select a major. Selection of a pre-professional program will allow you to receive advisement and preparation in your field of interest. If you do not select a major and only select a pre-professional program, we will consider you to be undecided-arts major.

Educational Opportunity Program/ Pre-Medical/Pre-Dental Plus (for New Jersey residents only)

The Educational Opportunity Program (EOP) is available to residents of New Jersey who are academically and economically disadvantaged. If you apply to this program, you will be required to submit your family's most recent tax returns and complete an on-campus interview. Admission to EOP requires you to participate in an intensive seven-week summer program to prepare you for a successful transition to college life. Health Professions

The Health Professions Program at Seton Hall is an academic resource to assist students in developing the necessary credentials to gain entrance into post-baccalaureate programs, including medicine, dentistry, physical therapy, physician assistant, optometry, podiatry, veterinary medicine, occupational therapy, speech-language pathology and athletic training. One-to-one mentoring between the student and the health professions adviser will ensure the proper selection of courses, enrollment into enrichment programs and assistance in the application process.

Leadership Studies

The Leadership Studies program is only available for Stillman School of Business students. The program enhances your existing talents by developing a core set of competencies. These essential skills include proficiency in strategic thinking, critical analysis, logical reasoning and oral and written communication. Practical business experience is an integral part of the program and is emphasized in our lecture series. During your junior year, you will be paired with mentors from our Leadership Council and work with these corporate executives on a project related to their company or organization. Engineering Program with NJIT

Seton Hall offers a unique 5-year dual-degree program in chemistry/physics and engineering with the New Jersey Institute of Technology (NJIT) that significantly enhances your opportunities in an increasingly competitive job market. The dual-degree program is an outstanding choice for students who understand the value of a liberal arts degree combined with the technical knowledge gained in an engineering program. All chemistry and physics courses are taught at Seton Hall. The chemistry and physics classes are small and students receive highly individualized attention from dedicated faculty.

applying as a transfer student

To be considered for admission, your admission file must be complete including the application for admission, official transcripts from colleges/universities previously attended (whether or not credit was earned or desired) sent directly from the registrar's office, official secondary school transcript sent directly from the high school attended, official SAT or ACT scores, Counselor Report, Teacher Evaluation, personal essay and payment of the application fee.

If you graduated from high school more than five years ago or have 30 transferable hours from an accredited institution you do not need to submit: official SAT or ACT scores, Counselor Report or Teacher Evaluation.

Transfer Credit

Transfer credit is generally assigned for academic courses passed with grades of C or above at accredited institutions of higher education for courses which are reasonably comparable to courses offered at Seton Hall. Seton Hall will accept up to 100 transfer credits and will waive core courses for those students with an Associate's of Art (A.A.) or an Associate's of Science (A.S.) degree. However, holders of Associate of Applied Science (A.A.S.) degree are not eligible for the core waiver.

Accelerated Nursing

The Accelerated Nursing Program is a 15-16 month cohort program beginning in September. The application deadline for the South Orange campus and Georgian Court campus programs is April 15. You must select a campus when you select a major on page 6. In order to apply to the Accelerated Nursing Program, students must have taken the prerequisites listed below and earned a C or better in those courses. The College of Nursing requires applicants to have at least 5 of the prerequisite classes completed before filing an application for admission. Acceptance of this coursework is subject to approval by Seton Hall.

applying as an international student

Seton Hall attracts students from all over the world, and we seek to facilitate an easy transition in the admissions process. To meet this goal, listed below are items that you as an international student need to consider when applying for admission.

Credential Evaluation

Seton Hall requires applicants with credentials from outside the U.S. to have all of their transcripts evaluated by World Educational Services (WES). We recommend the course-by-course evaluation. Contact info@wes.org or visit www.wes.org for more information.

Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL)

If your native language is not English, you must take the TOEFL regardless of citizenship. Take the TOEFL prior to submitting your application and make sure that official test scores are sent directly to Seton Hall (code for TOEFL scores is 2811). To register for the TOEFL visit www.TOEFL.org.

Proof of Citizenship

All international students are required to show proof of citizenship. Students residing outside the United States must submit a photocopy of the biographical and the expiration date pages of your passport. If you are currently in the U.S., you must submit a copy of:

- Your current visa;
- All pages of the I-20 from the current institution (if on F-I visa);
- Transfer of visa sponsorship form (if on F-I visa); and
- Both sides of the I-94 card in your passport.

Student Visa

If you are requesting a student visa, you will need to submit the following:

- Request for Certification of Eligibility (form I-20) and
- Proof of Funds and Declaration of Finances (if you have a sponsor), as well as, all required financial documentation.

Financial Aid

International students are not eligible for need-based financial aid and Seton Hall does not have any specific scholarships available for international students. However, international applicants who complete their applications may qualify for a University Scholarship, which will be awarded automatically if the student meets eligibility requirements (no special application required).

Our location in suburban South Orange, New Jersey, just 15 miles from New York City, provides unparalleled living and learning opportunities. financial aid

Seton Hall offers a generous program of merit and need based financial assistance. We ask for only one financial aid application. To be considered for any of the federal, state or University need-based aid programs, you must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). This form is used to determine your eligibility and does not require any processing fee. The FAFSA form is available through your guidance office, or it can be filed electronically by visiting www.fafsa.ed.gov.

Seton Hall encourages you to submit your FAFSA form as soon after January 1 as possible. We strongly recommend that you complete the FAFSA by February 15 to receive maximum consideration for financial aid. **Our Title IV Federal School Code is 002632.**

Every family should submit a FAFSA form. It is a common misconception that families should not file the FAFSA form because their income is too high. When the federal government calculates your ability to pay the Estimated Family Contribution (EFC), it considers factors other than your income — such as how many children are in your family, how many people in your household are in college, and how close your parents are to retirement. Also, students who file the FAFSA may receive various forms of aid because financial aid is more than just grants and scholarships. It also includes low-interest student loans and the ability to get a work/study position.

After you file your FAFSA, the federal government will send you and Seton Hall the results of your FAFSA form in approximately 4-6 weeks. However, if you file online, the results will take approximately 2 weeks. We take this information and create a financial aid package tailored to your needs. You will receive your financial aid package information in mid-to-late March if you are a freshman applicant and mid-to-late June if you are a transfer applicant.

We award financial aid to the majority of students, and we try to be fair and generous as possible in meeting your financial needs. In fact, 90 percent of incoming freshman receive aid — 75 percent receive assistance directly from the University.
