



# About the G. K. CHESTERTON INSTITUTE

### G. K. Chesterton Institute for Faith & Culture



The Institute is based at Seton Hall University, South Orange, N.J. Its purpose is to promote the thought of G. K. Chesterton and his circle and, more broadly, to explore the application of Chestertonian ideas in the contemporary world. The Institute's work consists of conferences, lecture series, research and writing. The move of the G. K. Chesterton Institute for Faith & Culture from Canada to America occurred twenty-two years ago. Monsignor Robert Sheeran, then President of Seton Hall, invited Father Ian Boyd to come to the University. In July 2020, after 46 years as President of the Institute and Editor of *The Chesterton Review*, Father Boyd retired. Upon his retirement he was named President Emeritus of the Institute and Founding Editor of *The Chesterton Review*. Father Boyd continues to be involved from afar in the work of the Institute.

Professor Dermot Quinn has taught History at Seton Hall University for

many years and in August 2020 became editor of The Chesterton Review.

Gloria Garafulich-Grabois, the Director of the G. K. Chesterton Institute for Faith & Culture and Managing Editor of *The Chesterton Review* and *The Lonergan Review*, a publication of the Bernard J. Lonergan Institute, is the other central member of our group.



### Father Ian Boyd on the Chesterton Institute

"I think in the work like the one we have been carrying out for just about **50** years at the Chesterton Institute, its effect is what I call cumulative. It builds up slowly, but it builds on its past, and in that way, I think it's Catholic, I think for us Catholics, we do think in terms of the future. We are people, that are Easter people. People of hope turning towards the future. So, this is not an antiquarian cult of Chesterton. We are talking about something immensely relevant for today and tomorrow and for the future.

My vision for the Institute has to do with making people aware of what is already present—of what has been going on for **50 years** and we hope will continue for another—for a hundred-years into the future. A Catholic university is not just for today, for the moment—it is for all time. I think that Chesterton is being re-discovered everywhere and we are, we can without boasting, we are at the center of that work and it would be of great interest to many people to know that, as I say, the secret of Seton Hall is partly the presence of the Chesterton Institute right here, in our own uni-

versity. I think the alumni, the Catholic world first of all, and even a larger world of those who read, and those who love Chesterton, that goes beyond, that is an ecumenical dimension. I think we represent that too.

Our Chesterton work is versatile, it deals with themes—particular themes. Chesterton has been there before us, we would like to alert people to the presence of that Chesterton work right here at the university.

"We need to startle people that at Seton Hall University, a leading Christian writer for our age finds his home, that he has been here, but his presence has not been well-known, not as well-known as it should be for the people in New Jersey, New York, America itself. We need to find a way to startle people, of surprising them." —Father Ian Boyd, C.S.B. "The more I considered Christianity," wrote G.K. Chesterton in *Orthodoxy* in 1908, "the more I found that while it had established a rule and order, the chief aim of that order was to give room for good things to run wild." The same might be said of the Institute that bears his name. We have our rules and orders, our regular series of happenings, but the purpose of that regularity is to allow good things to run wild. For almost fifty years now, at first in Canada and now for over two decades at Seton Hall, we have published *The Chesterton Review*, the premier journal in its field, rightly hailed for the range of its scholarship and the quality of its writing. Every year, in addition, we produce a full range of conferences and events to stimulate the mind and, we hope, to nourish the soul. Chesterton was a giant of a man, big in every way. To be Chestertonian is to be similarly large in spirit, equally generous in giving, comparably grateful for the gift of existence itself. If our work has the appearance of good things running wild, as I hope it does, Chesterton would surely have approved.

The Chesterton Review goes from strength to strength. At the beginning of the year, we published a well-received general issue with articles by, among others, David Pickering, Christopher Altieri, and our own Gregory Glazov. Our second issue, currently in production, is a Christopher Dawson special issue, about which I hope to write more next year. It breaks important and exciting new ground in Dawson scholarship. "There is nothing quite like *The Chesterton Review*," Professor Philip Jenkins remarked a few years ago, when our dear friend Father Ian Boyd was editor. He is still right.

In keeping with Chesterton's love of variety, our conferences and events this year could hardly have been more miscellaneous. In January, we collaborated on a theatrical production of Otello Cenci's play *Liberi Tutti!* (based on Chesterton's play *The Surprise),* which took place in Brescia, Italy. Closer to home, we hosted two dramatic readings by Seton Hall's Celtic Theatre Company, Dorothy L. Sayers's *The Man Born to be King* and Bruce Marshall's *Father Malachy's Miracle,* at both of which I offered commentary. Our cosponsored lectures with the Department of Catholic Studies included talks in March by Father Joseph Bertha, in April by Father Antonio Spadaro (a long-time friend of the Institute, whom I was pleased to introduce) and Bishop Brian Farrell (Secretary of the Dicastery for Promoting Christian Unity). In May, the Institute cohosted a large-scale launch of my book *Seton Hall University: A History, 1856-2006.* In November, we had another screening, this time in-person, of the Rimini Meeting's production of *Liberi Tutti!* Elsewhere, I spoke at Fordham University in November to commemorate the life and work of Gerald Russello, a Fellow of the Institute, whose far too early death in 2021 we still mourn. Finally, the Institute hosts a monthly Spanish-language Mass at Seton Hall, a longstanding and beautiful tradition at the university.

None of these "good things running wild" could have happened without the spiritual and financial support of the many friends and patrons of the Chesterton Institute. For that, my colleague Gloria Garafulich -Grabois and I are very grateful.


# About THE CHESTERTON REVIEW



Seton Hall University presented a book lecture and signing for Seton Hall University: A History, 1956-2006, written by professor and historian, Dr. Dermot Quinn.




In 2023, the G.K. Chesterton Institute for Faith & Culture at Seton Hall University published **volume 49** of its widely recognized journal.

All directness is divine. If God is hiding, in other words, He is hiding in plain sight. "Thinkers of [a particular] school have a tendency to believe that the concrete is a symbol of the abstract," Chesterton wrote in *The Speaker* in 1902. 'The truth, the truth at the root of all mysticism, is quite the other way. The abstract is the symbol of the concrete... Just in so far as we get into the abstract, we get away from the reality, we get away from the mystery... God made the concrete, but man made the abstract." Such is the theme that connects the articles of this issue. —Dermot Quinn, Editor

The issue contains an Introduction by Dermot Quinn, articles by John Peatfield, Gregory Dowling, Chris Altieri, Maxwell Patchet, David Pickering, Daniel Frampton and part II of Gregory Glazov article. As with all issues of the *Review*, there is also a good selection of Chesterton's own writing, along with Book and Film Reviews, as well as many News and Comments items, well as Letters and Photo Galleries.



This issue of The Chesterton Review, is a special issue devoted to the life and legacy of Christopher Dawson, the most important English Catholic historian of the twentieth century. Dawson, like Chesterton,, was a convert. He was also, like Chesterton, a powerful advocate for cultural and spiritual renewal in the face of growing secularity and the religious decline. An eloquent champion of the need for Europe to rediscover its Christian roots, he place an influential role in Catholic educational thinking on both sides of the Atlantic but especially in the United States. This new issue of the Review is excited to publish for the first time a recently discovered Dawson essay. It also brings together new writing on Dawson from the best scholars working in the field, including articles by Joseph Stuart, Adam Schwartz, James Lothian, Karl Schmude, and David Bonagura. With its usual complement of Chesterton items and its wide rage of letters, news and Comments, it is sure to be of interest to Dawson specialists alike. —Dermot Quinn, Editor
