## Terms of Acceptance

Please note that there is *no monetary award* for participation in a SHUmobile project. There are currently 3 models of Nokia devices for use in projects (N97, N95 and E71); the nature and scope of the proposed project will determine the type of device distributed to you and your students. Data plans will not be provided although participants with compatible SIM cards can use them in conjunction with the Nokia devices at their own expense. Although a data plan will not be provided, these devices can connect wirelessly to the Internet via the SHU network or another open connection (e.g. home). Training for both faculty and students will be provided by the TLT Center staff; faculty training will be held on a to-be-determined date before the start of the Spring semester and student training may require a dedicated portion of class time. Student distribution and training will take place after add/drop for the Spring 2010 semester. During the time of distribution, students will be required to sign a License Agreement which describes their responsibility for any loss or damage to the devices, similar to the agreement that is signed for laptop acquisition. Students and faculty will be required to return the devices at the end of the Spring 2010 semester.

The project lead may be asked to present on their particular project at a TLTC or TLTR sponsored event to share experiences and student projects. Project leads will also be asked to complete a short reflection which will be included on the SHUmobile blog <http://tltc.shu.edu/mobile/>. In addition, student and faculty surveys have been created by the TLT Center to measure the perceived impact of mobile devices within the various implemented projects. This survey will be delivered to students electronically at the completion of their particular project or course.
