MISSION STATEMENT

SETON HALL UNIVERSITY

MISSION STATEMENT

Seton Hall University is an independent Catholic university founded in 1856. The mission of the institution reflects a tradition of quality rooted in Judaeo-Christian values. The University distinguishes itself by its concern for the ethical and spiritual as well as intellectual development of its students.

Teaching, scholarship and service to the community are at the heart of universities everywhere and have built and shaped the goals of Seton Hall University. The University is committed to the education of students, to their intellectual and personal growth, and to their development as productive and responsible members of society. The University is committed to scholarship -- the discovery of and advancement of knowledge for its own sake and for its potential benefits to society. The University is committed to public service, both to New Jersey and to society at large.

The Catholic tradition permeates the values, ethics, and teachings of the University and undergirds the efforts to advance knowledge and solve societal problems. Taking advantage of its location in New Jersey, the University contributes to the development of the local area through the provision of cultural and community services which reinforce the educational mission. Seton Hall endeavors to integrate and build a firm foundation for students and faculty in the commitment to life-long learning, communication, and civic values. The University seeks to expand its influence through a regional and international student body.

THE UNIVERSITY

A BRIEF HISTORY OF SETON HALL UNIVERSITY

James Roosevelt Bayley, the first bishop of Newark and founder of Seton Hall, named the College after his aunt, St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, a Catholic convert like himself, and founder of the first community of the Sisters of Charity. The original enrollment of five students in 1856 grew rapidly, and four years later the College moved from its first home in Madison (which became the site of St. Elizabeth's College) to its present location in South Orange. Early the following year the College was incorporated and chartered by the State of New Jersey.

During the first 12 years, 531 students entered the College. The student body grew to 119 and there were 17 seminarians and 16 faculty members, including four priests; students came from places as far away as Mexico, Cuba, Brazil, France, Spain and Italy as well as 17 states.

In spite of setbacks such as three major fires, and lean times during the war years, the College continued to grow. The preparatory school curriculum was separated in 1897 and eventually organized into a separate school. University College, originally known as Extension Division and later Urban Division, began in 1937, as did the first summer session. This marked the first time that women were admitted to the faculty and the student body.

The College was organized into a university in 1950 and comprised the College of Arts and Sciences and the Schools of Business, Education, and Nursing. The School of Law opened in Newark in 1951. Seton Hall opened a campus in Paterson in 1954, which operated for 20 years. In 1955 Seton Hall launched New Jersey's first college of medicine and dentistry, later taken over by the State of New Jersey. The University became fully coeducational in 1968 when all Newark day and evening programs, except those of the School of Law, were consolidated and moved to South Orange.

Modernization and construction continued into the 1970's. A new residence hall, sports facilities, and academic buildings for the business and nursing schools were completed in South Orange as well as a new Law Center in Newark.

Continued construction and expansion of academic programs has marked the 1980's. In 1984, the Immaculate Conception Seminary returned to campus in a new facility as the School of Theology. A new residence hall opened in 1986, a student recreation center in 1987, and a second new residence hall will open in 1988. New doctoral programs were begun by the College of Education in 1980 as well as a Master of Public Administration degree in the College of Arts and Sciences in 1982 and a Master of Taxation in the School of Business in 1985. The School of Graduate Medical Education was established in 1987. In July of 1987, Seton Hall Preparatory School officially separated from the University as a separate corporate entity.

- 1927 - Seminary moves to Darlington
- 1931 - The nickname, Pirates, given to the school after a 5-run, 9th inning rally brought a 12-11 victory over Holy Cross, prompting a local sports writer to say "That Seton Hall team is a gang of Pirates."
- 1933 - Accreditation by Middle States Association
- 1933 - Seton Hall joined Association of American Colleges and American Council on Higher Education
- 1933 - All sports programs dropped (basketball returns in 1935)
- 1933 - Benny Savage, a long-term employee on the Seton Hall farm, died leaving an insurance policy of \$50,000 to Seton Hall, the first major bequest in the School's history.
- 1936 - First courses in accounting, finance, international trade, business law, electives
- 1937 - Founding of Brownson Debate Society
- 1937 - Newark extension division opened, admitting women for the first time (Mary Grace Dougherty registered as first woman student)
- 1937 - Jersey City Extension Division opened first summer session
- 1938 - Bayley Seton League founded
- 1939 - Construction of Walsh Auditorium began
- 1939 - Cross country team won A.A.U. title
- 1940 - First Nursing education courses
- 1940 - Walsh Auditorium-Gymnasium opened

- 1943 - M.A. in administration and supervision, and guidance offered; New Jersey C.P.A. Board approved business and accounting curriculum.
- 1946 - 94% of enrolled students were veterans
- 1948 - WSOU/FM went on the air, the first collegiate operated radio station in the State of New Jersey
- 1950 - Seton Hall College became Seton Hall University after request to change status was granted by the New Jersey State Legislature. Four Schools are established: Arts & Sciences, Business, Education, Nursing
- 1951 - School of Law founded with Miriam Rooney as the first woman dean of law in the United States
- 1951 - Swimming team won Eastern Collegiate Championship
- 1952 - Boland Hall opened
- 1952 - Andy Stanfield of the track team won first place for the United States at the Helsinki Olympics
- 1953 - Basketball team wins 27 consecutive games, and wins the National Invitational Tournament. Walter Dukes and Richie Regan named to All-American team.
- 1954 - McNulty Hall opened
- 1954 - Paterson College began as an extension branch of Seton Hall (operated until 1979)
- 1955 - Institute of Judaeo-Christian Studies established
- 1955 - McLaughlin Library opened
- 1956 - College of Medicine and Dentistry started; taken over by the State of New Jersey in 1964
- 1962 - Bishop Dougherty Student Center opened
- 1964 - Baseball team participated in the College World Series in Omaha, Nebraska for the first time
- 1964 - First Ph.D. program offered in Chemistry
- 1966 - Puerto Rican Institute established
- 1968 - Humanities Building dedicated

- 1968 - South Orange campus became fully coeducational
- 1970 - Center for African-American Studies (formerly the Center for Black Studies) inaugurated
- 1971 - First Residence Hall for women opened on September 2
- 1972 - Pub opened in Student Center

- 1975 - Track and field team won both the indoor and the outdoor IC4A championships
- 1975 - St. Elizabeth Ann Seton canonized in Rome
- 1976 - New Law Center in Newark dedicated on May 3 with U.S. Supreme Court Justice Thurgood Marshall as speaker
- 1980 - Doctoral program in the School of Education inaugurated
- 1980 - Governance of Seton Hall restructured with a 25 member Board of Regents and a 13 member Board of Trustees
- 1980 - Richard J. Hughes Chair for Constitutional and Public Law and Service dedicated at the Law Center with Gov. Brendan Byrne and former Gov. Hughes in attendance
- 1981 - Educational affiliation agreement with the Peoples' Republic of China promulgated
- 1983 - U.S. President Ronald Reagan receives an honorary degree and addresses graduates at Commencement
- 1984 - Immaculate Conception Seminary returns to South Orange from Darlington.
- 1985 - Seton Hall Prep moves to West Orange
- 1986 - A new residence hall is opened on campus, with an additional one planned for 1988.






Undergraduate Student Enrollment






Credit Hours Enrolled












Financial Aid Expenditures





REVENUES AND EXPENSES BEFORE TRANSFERS


Current Unrestricted and Restricted Funds - Fiscal 1982 to 1987

CURRENT UNRESTRICTED REVENUES




1987-88 ORIGINAL UNIVERSITY BUDGET


