
A CATHOLIC VISION OF LIFE

All of us live by some philosophy, whether we know it or not. These four lectures will present a Catholic vision of life inspired by the work of Bernard Lonergan, S. J. (1904–1984) and his writings on human consciousness. Lonergan was a Canadian Jesuit theologian whose works have had a worldwide influence. His work itself was rooted in the Christian doctrines of the Trinity, Christ and grace as well as in classic philosophy, John Henry Newman and the contemporary sciences. Participants will be asked to identify the elements of a Catholic and catholic - wholistic - vision in their own experiences.

More about Monsignor Richard M. Liddy

Monsignor Liddy is currently a faculty member of the Religious Studies Department and previously served as spiritual director and rector/dean of Immaculate Conception Seminary School of Theology. In addition, he served as acting chancellor of the University in 1990. He also was spiritual director of the North American College in Rome from 1980 to 1984. Monsignor Liddy's doctoral dissertation examined the work of the American philosopher of art, Susanne K. Langer. In 1978 he published a book of poetry, *In God's Gentle Arms*. In 1993 he published a work on the Jesuit philosopher-theologian, Bernard J. Lonergan (1904-84), entitled *Transforming Light: Intellectual Conversion in the Early Lonergan*. His next book, "Startling Strangeness": Reading Lonergan's Insight, was published in November 2006. This latest work treats his own encounter with Lonergan as the philosopher's student in Rome in the 1960s. Also in 2006, the Bernard J. Lonergan Institute at Seton Hall was inaugurated, under the direction of Monsignor Liddy. The Institute functions as a research center containing all significant primary and secondary literature on Lonergan, and will serve to implement his vision of integrating Catholic theology with modern culture. Monsignor Liddy has written articles in national periodicals on the thought of Cardinal Newman as well as on art, education, formation and Church leadership. Recently he has written on method and methodological distinctions between the disciplines. For recreation, he enjoys playing golf.

The Center maintains a global focus in international scholarship and is the home of the **G.K Chesterton Institute for Faith & Culture**, as well as the **Bernard J. Lonergan Institute**. The Institutes offer opportunities for study and research, as well as ongoing programs related to faith and culture. In addition, the **Micah Institute for Business and Economics** concentrates on communicating Catholic Social Teaching and ethics to business education at Seton Hall and the wider business community. The Center also publishes the prestigious *Chesterton Review* and *The Lonergan Review.
