Be Intelligent: What caught you in the article? Did you make connections with your own story or your familial stories of discrimination or bias? Were you able to walk in Vincent Stewart's shoes? Who are you lifting up?

Be Reasonable: How will the Scripture reading, this article, and your group's conversation today inform your thoughts, and actions in the coming months?

Be Responsible: What were key insights that surfaced in today's discussion? Any food for further contemplation? Any action steps? What are the implications for you at work, in your community and at home? Leverage the conversation for good!

Closing Prayer: Jesuit Inspired

Nothing is more practical than finding God, than falling in love in a quite absolute way. What you are in love with, what seizes your imagination, will affect everything.
