MICHEAL O'SIADHAIL is an Irish poet living in New York whose work has been widely praised for its formal beauty and emotional power. A first-class honours graduate of Trinity College, Dublin, where he was a Foundation Scholar, for many years he taught at various universities including his alma mater, Harvard, Yale, and the University of Iceland. He is a member of Aosdana, Ireland's Academy of Distinguished Artists. O'Siadhail's work has been compared to that of Donne, Rilke, Dante, and Patrick Kavanagh but, as one critic has written, "it may be that he has done something rare—he has created his own tradition."
