BACKGOUND METHODS

PURPOSE

The purpose of this quality initiative is to bridge the gap between evidence and practice related to the management of intravenous (IV) fluids. With 90% of patients receiving IV fluids during the course of their hospital stay, increased awareness could have a substantial impact.

Recent studies indicate
a higher complication rate than
previously believed related to IV
therapy. Adverse effects impact
recovery time, length of stay, cost,
patient safety and survival.
Related complications are largely
preventable and unmet
educational needs are prevalent.

Education has traditionally focused on benefits of IV therapy with minimal emphasis on potential harm. According to research, cautious practice yields improved patient outcomes. Changing deepseated beliefs in healthcare presents a challenge. Educating student nurses prior to entry into practice will facilitate safer

POTENTIAL ADVERSE EFFECTS/COMPLICATIONS

- Pulmonary Edema
- Impaired wound healing
- Gastrointestinal Problems
- Worsening renal function
- Mild cerebral edema →*risk for falls
- Hyponatremia → *risk for falls
- Worsening anemia
- Acid-base imbalances
