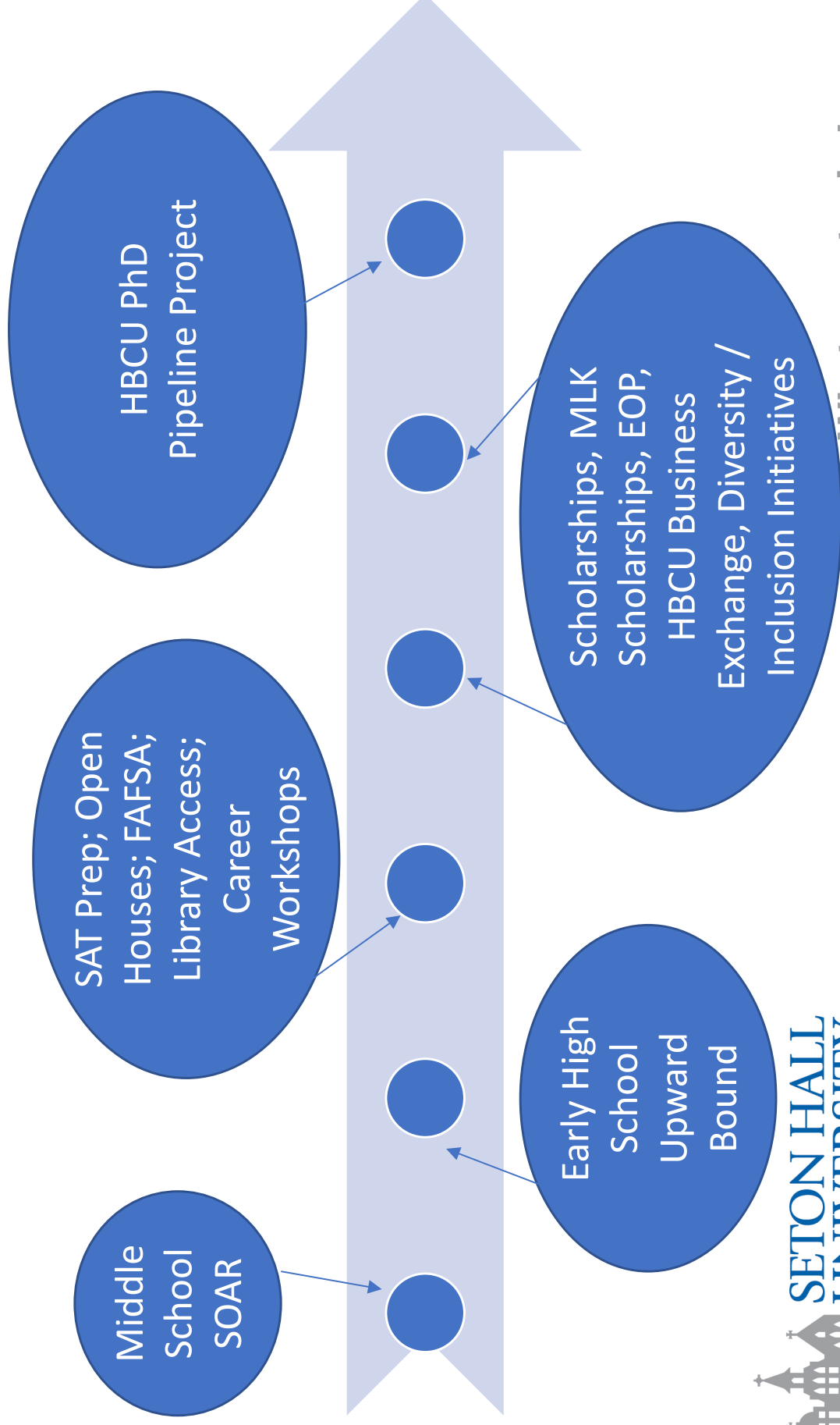

The HBCU Pipeline Project

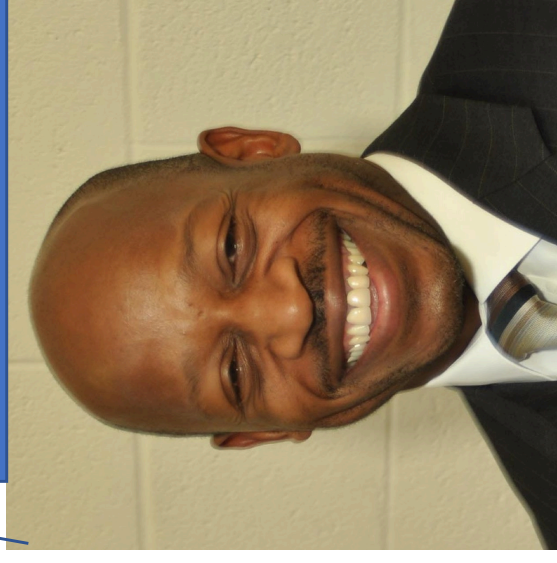
1960s: Dr. Ed Alcamo; babysat for his family and heard the word "PhD" for the first time in my life.



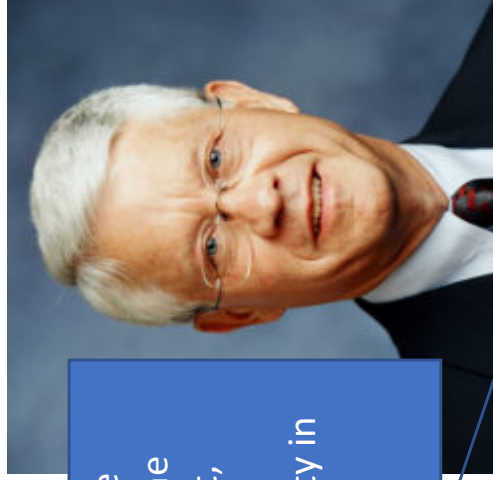
1990: Then newly minted PhD Neil deGrasse Tyson was the PhD student speaker at my PhD graduation at Columbia University.



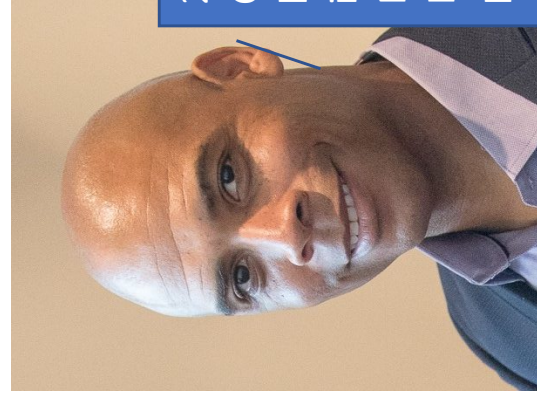

Dear Dean Van Sapp:

I hope your fall semester is off to a great start!

Inspired by my attendance at this summer's HBCU Business Deans Conference, with its theme of "Building and Strengthening Relationships," I am writing to invite you to participate in a collaboration with the Stillman School of Business at Seton Hall University involving mutual "mini-exchange" experiences for our students. Through this initiative, I hope that we can widen the exposure of all our business students – yours and ours – beyond their own college experience, while encouraging them to network more broadly.

We would like to extend to your students the opportunity to visit our campus, for 2-3 days, in order to connect with our students, faculty and alumni and participate in one of our signature School-wide events. We would house your students in residence halls with our Stillman students, pay for their expenses while in residence, and organize other activities for their benefit (e.g., a trip to New York City or attendance at a sports event). The only expense that your school would have to underwrite would be the cost of your students' travel from your campus to Seton Hall and back.

At this time, we have three "mini-exchange" events in mind, all of which would take place in the Spring 2020 semester. Our **Jim and Judy O'Brien Capital Markets Colloquium, scheduled for February 12, 2020**, is a day-long series of small-group workshops that bring students, faculty and industry professionals together for discussions of issues impacting the capital markets. The event includes a networking luncheon that features a keynote speaker from the finance industry. To give you an idea of the nature of the workshops and speakers, I have enclosed programs from the past two years. (In 2018, we focused on "Women in Finance," and all of our workshops were led by women.)

As a second option, we would be happy to schedule a visit that would allow your students to attend our Pirates Pitch Startup Competition, which will be held the evening of **Wednesday, April 1, 2020**. We haven't finalized the information for this year's competition, but you may visit the website from the 2019 competition at <http://blogs.shu.edu/piratespitch/>. You'll see that the process begins with submission of an executive summary of a proposed or existing startup business. If your students are interested in competing, I would be happy to work out arrangements with my colleague who directs our Center for Entrepreneurial Studies and the Pirates Pitch competition.

Finally, we also would be delighted to host your students for our third annual **Sports Business and Media Ethics Symposium**. While the date has not yet been finalized, this event, a collaboration between the Stillman School's Center for Sport Management and the College of Communication and the Arts, is typically held in **early April**. Past speakers have included David Stern, former NBA Commissioner, Adam Silver, current NBA Commissioner, and ESPN's Bob Ley and Steven A. Smith.

If you would be interested in offering any of these opportunities to your students, please contact me. This will be our first experience with this type of mini-exchange, and we are open to any suggestions that you may have for its execution. For example, if you would like to send some students from outside the business school, that would be fine as well. Of course, I also would be delighted to hear about any opportunities that you might have to host our students on your campus. I know our students' experiences would be enriched by the chance to visit new places and network with business students from other schools.

To give you some geographical context, Seton Hall University is located in South Orange, New Jersey, which is a 58-minute train ride into New York City and only 12 miles from Newark Liberty International Airport. Attached, you will see the profile of our 2018 incoming class of first-year students and their majors. Our profile for 2019 is quite similar but that will not be finalized until October 2019.

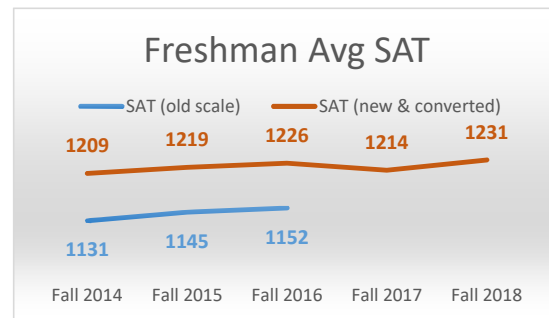
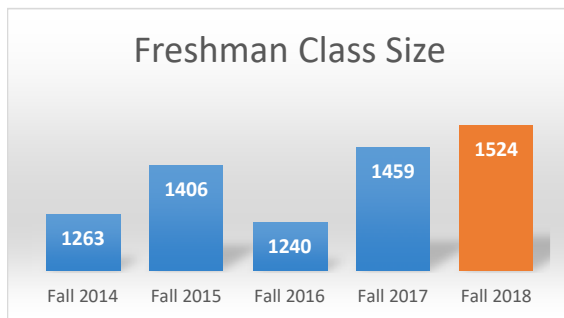

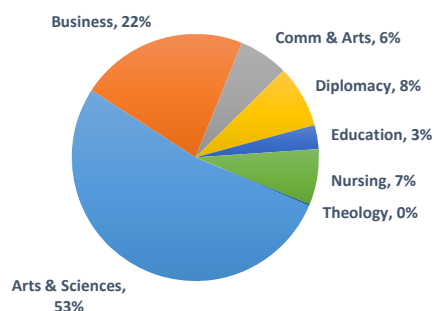

Seton Hall takes great pride in the diversity of its community and the robust offerings it provides to engage students from many backgrounds. Thanks to the good work of individuals from across our campuses, the past year has seen the development of inclusion initiatives.

This year, in President Nyre's shared goals for the Executive Cabinet, he has tasked further enriching the University's diversity and inclusion landscape.

We began by creating a [provisional inventory](#) that shows the numerous ways — big and small — that Seton Hall promotes inclusion. Here are a few highlights:

- Kelly Harris, Ph.D., has joined the University as director of the Africana Studies and a full-time faculty member in the Department of Political Science and Public Administration.
- To improve visibility and accessibility, the Office of Equal Employment Opportunity and Title IX Compliance has moved from the lower level of Presidents Hall to the second floor of Bayley Hall. Also, the office has updated anti-harassment and Title IX training for employees and students.
- In the seminar "Challenging Racism and Teaching for Inclusion," faculty reflect on issues of diversity and learn how to develop course materials that focus on justice and equality.
- The new Inclusion Alliance works with student groups and in University Life to train students in supporting skills such as active listening, mirroring responses, and conflict resolution.

The inventory — which constitutes only a snapshot of Seton Hall's overall commitment to diversity and inclusion — continues the University's longstanding tradition of welcoming all.

Next, we are establishing a University-wide diversity and inclusion committee that will build on existing initiatives and help shape new ones. President Nyre specified that members of this committee be drawn from a wide swath of the campus community, including faculty, clergy, administrators and staff members. To that end, outreach will be made to student and faculty governance groups as well as clergy, administrators and staff members.

The committee will enhance the many aspects of diversity and inclusion at Seton Hall by working with campus partners on the broadest possible basis, including the Provost, Student Government Association, Student Services, and Mission and Ministry. Ultimately, the committee will allow the University to expand its commitment to diversity and inclusion, staying abreast of emerging ideas, taking advantage of unforeseen opportunities and recommending new initiatives.

As a Catholic university of great minds, standing in the tradition of God's summons for all people to come together in unity (Matt 28:19; Gal 3:28), we are committed to fostering a diverse and unified community. 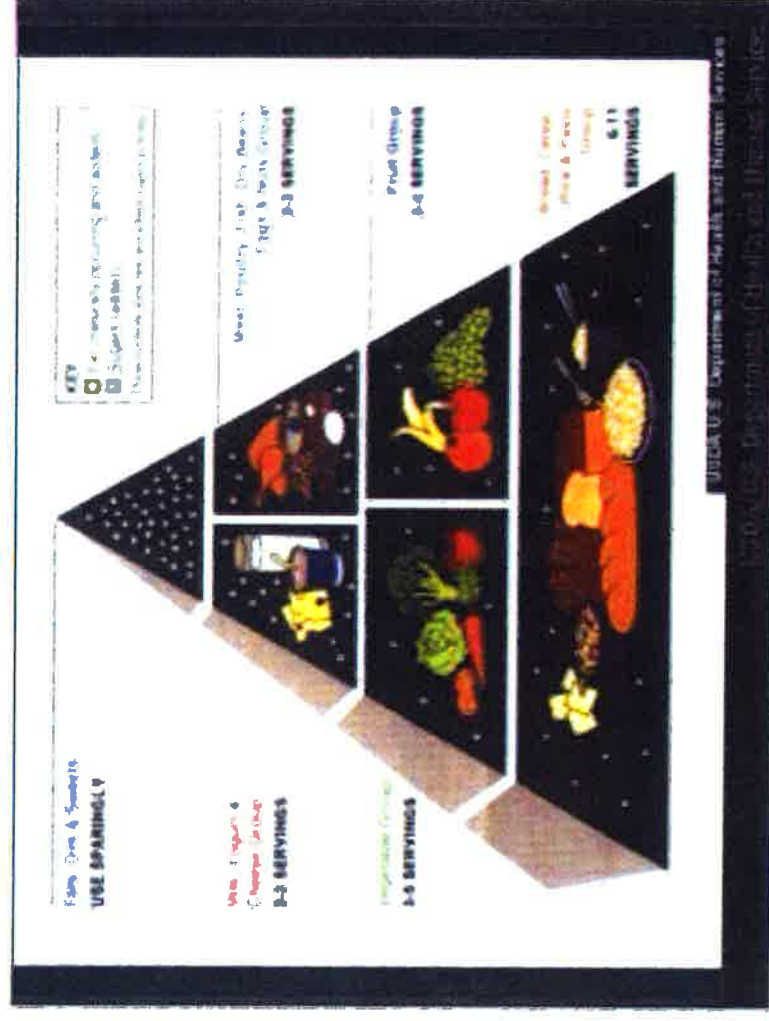
