This course, EDST 3900 Engaging the World: Comparative Education Studies through Travel Abroad, will be offered to students this spring 2020 semester as a 3-credit undergraduate course. In the course, students compare and contrast educational practices between Japan and the United States. Within that comparative exploration, students additionally consider the seven principles of Catholic Social Teaching and how those principles are visible in the educational practices in the US and in Japan. During the regular spring semester, students will attend class sessions on the South Orange campus.

The travel portion will take place immediately following the close of the spring semester and will conclude prior to May 31st. For the travel portion, students will visit 8 days in the Tokyo area making field visits to an elementary, middle school, high school and a university. During the school visits students will observe and participate in regular classroom instruction, speak with educators about the profession, make presentations to small and large audiences about the US school system and how it is similar to and different from the Japanese system. At the university location, we will participate in intercultural exchange activities and attend brief lectures from experts in education. In between school visits, students will visit locations of historical and cultural significance in the Tokyo area (e.g., Asakusa shrine/temple complex, Akihabara electric town, Tokyo Disneyland, Tokyo Edo History Museum, Tokyo Tower, among others). Japanese language ability is not required for students to fully participate in the travel portion.

Participant Requirements

Participants should be aware that the trip will involve:

- Walking 6-8 miles per day
- Adapting to a different diet: Please notify faculty of any food restrictions or dispreferences
- Dressing and behaving according to local customs
- Wearing professional clothing during 4 school visits
- Exposure to high temperatures and/or humidity (summer weather in Tokyo is in the 80s-90s with high humidity)
- Travel on crowded subway trains: Students who feel claustrophobia should be aware that the group travels on crowded subway trains on 2 occasions during the week
- Visiting schools that may not have elevators / be fully accessible
