# NEARLY HALF OF COLLEGE FOOTBALL FANS STILL DON'T 'GET' WHAT MAKES UP THE BCS FORMULA FOR NATIONAL TITLE GAME

### OVER 70% WOULD LIKE A TOURNAMENT LIKE NCAA BASKETBALL

S. Orange, NJ, December 4, 2008 – According to a new Seton Hall Sports Poll, almost half of the nation's college football fans are not familiar with the formula used to determine the teams in the NCAA's national championship game.

The poll was conducted this week among 1,052 people randomly called across the country, including 599 college football fans. This is the third year in which Seton Hall Sports Poll has questioned fans about the BCS formula

And while that figure -46% - represents some progress for the NCAA (last year's poll put the number at 54%), it does carry over to 74% of fans thinking that there should be a tournament similar to the NCAA basketball's elimination tournament held each March. (Last year the figure was 77%).

"Imagine if fans didn't understand how teams got to the World Series or the Super Bowl," noted Rick Gentile, director of the Seton Hall Sports Poll, conducted by the Sharkey Institute. "This is a major American championship and its own fans don't really know how the competing teams are chosen."

A year ago, then President-elect Barack Obama injected his own view that there should be a playoff system, but 82% of respondents said that he should stay out of the debate rather than use his influence. This year, the question was asked in general about "elected officials" and 81% said they should stay out of it. 60% agreed with the idea of an 8-team playoff, similar to the 63% who agreed with Obama's 2008 suggestion,

"It's frustrating to fans, year after year, to see no change in the system and no greater understanding of the road to the title game," said Gentile. "and the polls reflect that."

Asked what sort of a playoff would be preferred if that system was adopted, those who follow college football found 34% favoring an 8-team playoff, with 36% citing 16 teams, and 9% voting for a 4-team playoff.

84% of college fans (and 83% of all respondents), felt that the BCS formula should be altered to allow all major universities a fairer opportunity to play for the national championship.

The poll was conducted by telephone among a random digit dial sample between November 30-December 2, 2009. The poll was weighted to reflect the national distribution age, race and gender. The margin of error due to sampling is +/- 3.8 percentage points for most estimates. The margin of error is higher for certain sub groups. Other factors also may affect the total error.
