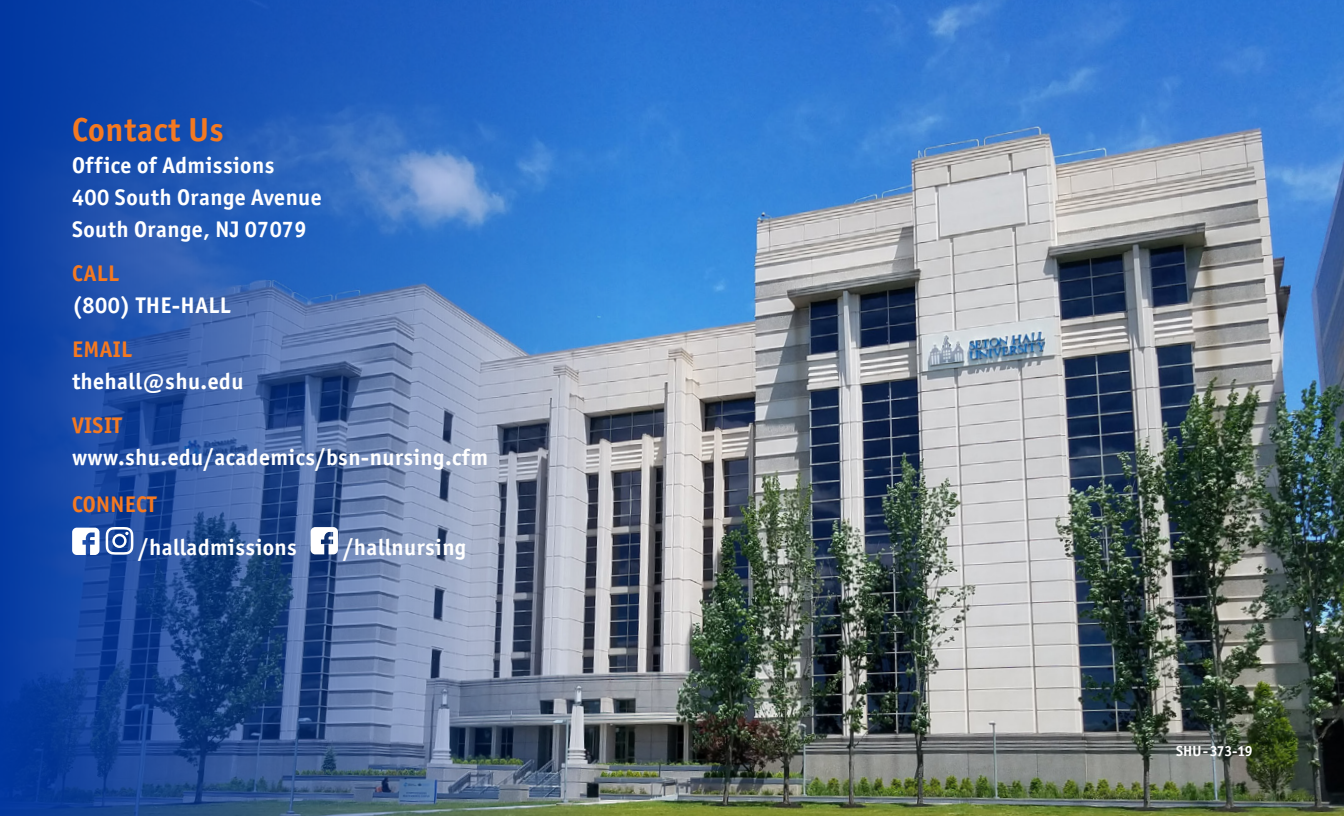

Nursing education involves a complex and exciting mix of learning opportunities. You can gain hands-on experience in our state-of-the-art Clinical Simulation and Skills Laboratories, as well as participate in the service-learning opportunities and diverse clinical experiences. By the time you graduate, you’ll have completed eight clinical experiences in a variety of healthcare settings.

Curriculum

The nursing curriculum is built on Seton Hall’s intellectually challenging university core curriculum with a foundation in the liberal arts and sciences. The curriculum includes classes and clinical experiences utilizing high- and low-fidelity simulation in our expanded clinical simulation and skills laboratories, plus integration of a wide array of technological enhancements including avatar-based software, electronic health records, e-books, tutorials and various online learning resources throughout the program.

Nursing students spend their first three semesters at Seton Hall on the South Orange campus. Those three semesters consist primarily of foundational sciences, humanities and core courses. After that, they begin immersing themselves in clinical and nursing courses and skill development on our IHS campus.
