Navigating Difficult Student Conversations

Scripting and SSC Features to Help You Navigate Difficult Student Conversations

Scenario: Student is underprepared for a program with selective admission requirements or needs to change their major for academic reasons.

Sample Scripting

"I'm noticing that you're not performing well in some critical courses. What's going on? What is it about these courses that prevented you from getting the grade you wanted?"

"Laying a strong foundation in these courses now is important since you are going to be facing a lot of [math] in this major and it is only going to increase in difficulty. What are you going to change to improve your performance in this subject?"


"Let's take a look at what courses you have performed well in and which academic areas you excel in. This way, we can begin to discuss a parallel plan to provide you a pathway toward a career and degree that matches your interests with your academic strengths."

Features to Utilize in This Scenario

You can use the **Student Overview** to perform a "30-second gut check," quickly assessing how the student is performing compared to students who have historically succeeded in the major. A **medium or high risk level** can serve as a quick indicator that something is going wrong.



Success Progress: Missed Success Markers in the student's major (especially competitive or limited-access majors) may be a sign of slow progress toward a degree or toward admission into the program, as well as difficulty in upcoming courses.



GPA Trend/GPA Compared to Threshold: A downward trend is a key predictor of diminishing likelihood to graduate in a given major. A student's GPA compared to the threshold GPA for the major can also indicate how close or far they are from being eligible for admission.

Sample Scripting (for Outreach)


"Based on your cumulative GPA of [2.3], you qualify for additional one-on-one support, including a planning conversation with me. Please reach out to me by Friday to schedule a conversation."

Sample Scripting

"Let's have a discussion about where you are in your program. I have to be realistic with you about what it takes to get into this major. In order to improve your GPA enough to [move forward in your program/be admitted to the selected major/go on to graduate school], you would need to earn a 4.0 in all of your courses across the next year."

"Let's have a conversation about what drew you to nursing in the first place. Why do you want to be a nurse? You chose nursing because you want to help people. What is it about helping people that interests you? Have you ever thought about helping people as it relates to your strengths in [sociology]?"


"If you're ready to start on that new path, I have a contact in the health sciences department who knows a lot about the nutrition major. I will provide you with their contact information so you can connect with them. Then, I will follow up with them directly to let them know to expect you and prepare to discuss the major change."



Advanced Search Filters and **Worklists** can be used to create lists of students to actively monitor. You can also launch an Appointment Campaign for any list, to initiate face-to-face conversation with students about their progress.



Major Explorer can be used to help the student build a parallel plan, explore alternative majors, or explore careers for an alternative major they have already decided on.

Features to Utilize in This Scenario


Advanced Search Filters and **Worklists** can be used to create lists of students within certain GPA tiers, or with other specific risk indicators, to monitor or conduct outreach.



Sample Scripting

"Helping students succeed is what I'm passionate about. I had my own struggles in college. In your case, I am noticing some sharp changes in your [GPA/credit accumulation]. Is there something going on that is affecting your academic performance?"

Academic Performance Trends within the **Student Progress** tab can serve as a quick indicator that something is going wrong. **Success Progress** charts can be used to identify a steep drop in GPA or a drop-off in credit accumulation. This should prompt you to enter the exploration stage and begin asking probing questions.






Scenario: Student is in need of a referral to another office for a specific reason.

Features to Utilize in This Scenario

Alerts: Issuing an alert can initiate specific referral or follow-up activities based on the permissions and configurations established within your platform.



Scenario: Student reveals difficult financial situation.

Resources Across Campus

- · Financial Aid Office
- Name, Title (Ex: John Smith, Assistant Director of Financial Aid)

Sample Scripting: "Are you familiar with the location of the Financial Aid Office? I can have someone accompany you there to speak with someone who can help you with this."

Scenario: Advisor suspects that the student is in need of mental health counseling.

Resources Across Campus

- · Counseling Office/Student Affairs
- · Name, Title (Ex: Abigail Adams, Clinical Director)

Sample Scripting: "Are you familiar with the location of the XX office? I can have someone accompany you there to speak with someone who can assist you with this matter."

NOTE: Advisors should follow up with department chairs, associate deans, and/or Student Affairs to flag any situations involving personal and interpersonal violence; threats against oneself and/or another person/group likely to result in harm, injury, or death; and threats that might imperil the mission of the university—per specific university policies.

Scenario: Student is placed on academic probation, suspension, etc.

Resources Across Campus

- College Name, Dean's Office
- Name(s), Associate Dean(s)

Sample Scripting: "Are you familiar with the requirements you need to fulfill to get back into the program or get off of probation?"
