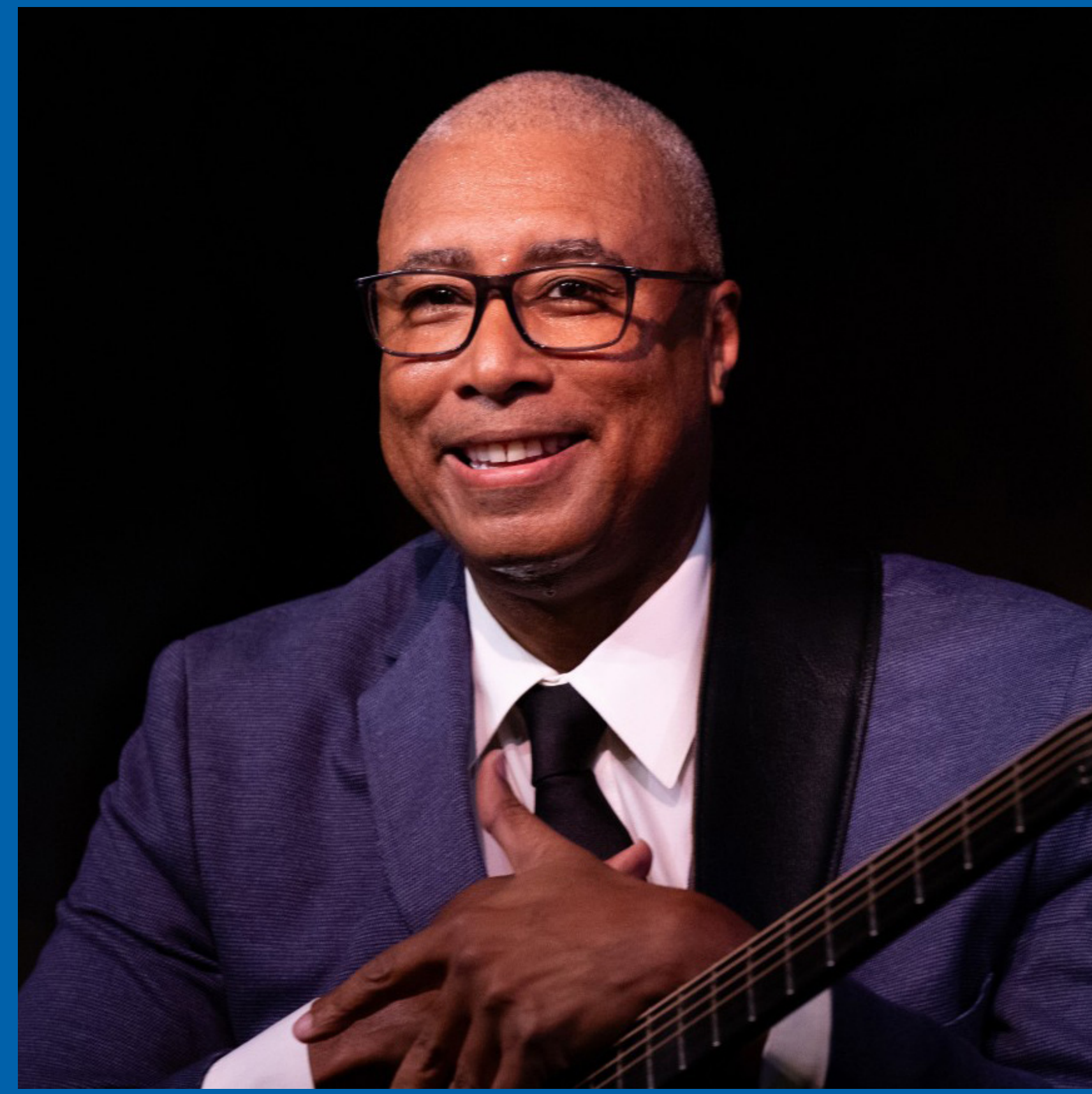


Bernie Williams

PUERTO RICAN BASEBALL CHAMPION AND CULTURAL AMBASSADOR



BACKGROUND

Born on September 13, 1968, in San Juan, Puerto Rico, Bernie Williams grew up surrounded by both athletics and music.
