

Desi Arnaz

CUBAN-AMERICAN ENTERTAINER AND TELEVISION PIONEER



BACKGROUND

Born on March 2, 1917, in Santiago de Cuba, Desi Arnaz came from a wealthy and politically connected family. Following political upheaval in Cuba, his family fled to the United States, settling in Miami when he was a teenager. Arnaz adapted quickly, learning English and working various jobs before pursuing a career in music. He gained recognition as a bandleader and performer, developing a distinctive style that blended Latin rhythms with American popular music, paving the way for his entry into entertainment.

CAREER

Arnaz rose to national fame as the co-star of the groundbreaking television show *I Love Lucy*, where he starred alongside Lucille Ball.
