

Diego de Gardoqui

SPANISH DIPLOMAT AND REVOLUTIONARY WAR SUPPORTER



BACKGROUND

Born in 1735, in Spain, Diego de Gardoqui came from a prominent merchant family engaged in global trade. His father's international business exposed him to commerce, finance, and politics. As a young man, he studied in London, where he learned English and developed an understanding of British and colonial markets. Upon returning to Spain, Gardoqui joined the family enterprise, strengthening its transatlantic connections and preparing for a future that would link Spain to the emerging United States.

CAREER
