BACKGROUND

Born on July 3, 1832, in Baja California, then part of Mexico, María Amparo Ruiz de Burton came from a prominent Californio family with deep political and military roots. After marrying U.S. Army officer Henry S. Burton, she moved to the United States, where she lived across regions and engaged with both Mexican and American communities.
