Aleksy Tarasenko-Struc joins Seton Hall University as an assistant professor of philosophy with a secondary appointment in the School of Health and Medical Sciences. He is also director of SHU's Medical Humanities Program. He completed a PhD in philosophy at Harvard University, where his work was supported by the Edmond J. and Lily Safra Center for Ethics. Most recently, he held a clinical ethics fellowship at the Alden March Bioethics Institute at Albany Medical College. His research lies in ethics (particularly bioethics), social philosophy, and their intersection. His work concerns the dehumanizing aspects of wrongful clinical practices, as well as the scope of justified paternalism in medicine and the nature of decisional capacity.
