Institutions struggle to demonstrate an ability to produce graduates with the 'soft skills' required for the modern workplace.




Since 2019, supervisors and coworkers have rated Seton Hall interns on the soft skills employers value most.

- O3 Show a high level of dedication toward doing a good job


